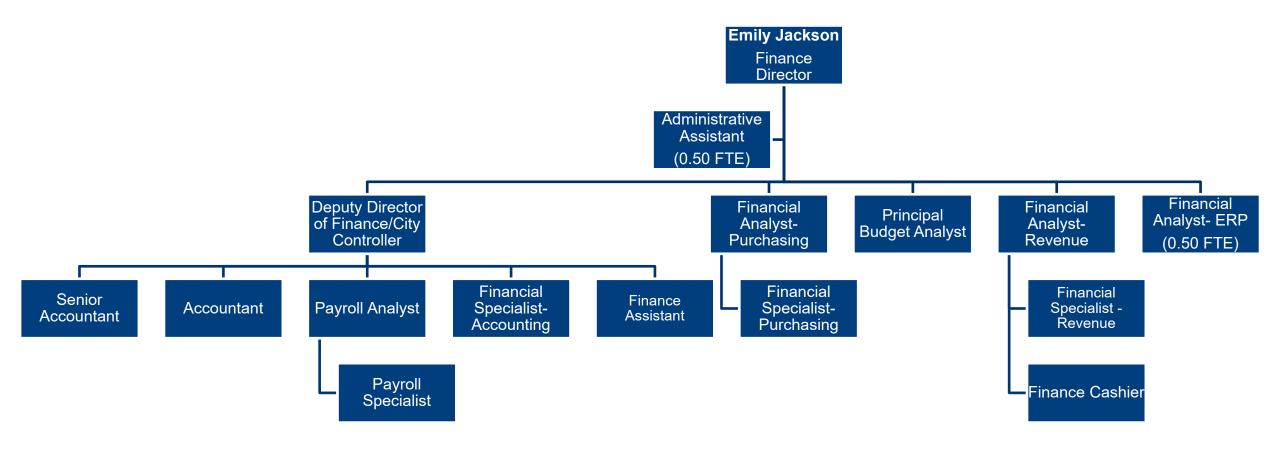

Finance Overview – Who We Are



15.00 Full Time Equivalent (FTE) employees

Finance Department Overview - Programs & Funding

Accounting 7.00 FTE

Prepares Citywide financial statements, ensures integrity of financial data, processes AP and Payroll. Financial reports must be compliant with State & Federal regulations.

Oracle (ERP) Implementation and Configuration 0.50 FTE

Responsible for ongoing implementation and configuration of City's ERP to maximize functionality.

Administration 1.50 FTE

Plans, organizes, leads, and monitors the department. Responsible for Treasury functions including debt and investments.

Purchasing 2.00 FTE

Administers purchasing and contracting policies to effectuate efficient procurement. Leads efforts to secure maximum FEMA and CalOES reimbursement for 2023 storm events.

Budget 1.00 FTE

Coordinates Citywide development, preparation, and reporting on the City's budget. Provides staff support to Revenue Enhancement Oversight Commission.

Revenue 3.00 FTE

Administers the City's revenue operations including accounts receivable, in accordance with established fiscal policies.

FY 2023-24 Budget: \$2.4 million

Recent Accomplishments

- Secured financing for the Cultural Arts District Parking Structure
- Completed FY 2022-23 Audit process and developed Annual Comprehensive Financial Report and Popular Annual Financial Report
- Submitted over \$9M in eligible storm related costs to FEMA for review and consideration of reimbursement
- Assured ongoing funding for core services while addressing unbudgeted storm expenditures
 - Activation of Fiscal Health Contingency Plan to control expenditures
- Onboarded six new employees in the last year!

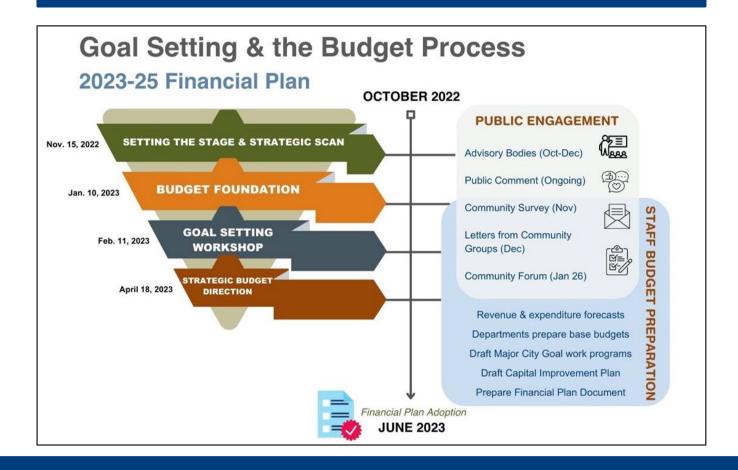

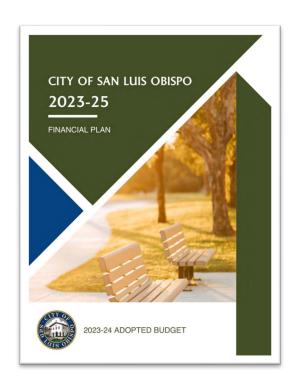


What Would You Ask?

Context:

- Safety issues on South Broad Street
- Transportation improvements to South Broad Street were envisioned in 2014 South Broad Area Plan and 2021 Active Transportation Plan
- Approximately \$30M worth of active transportation/transportation safety projects have recently been completed or are in progress and more are on the way
- Broad Street improvements project is not fully scoped, but is estimated to cost \$12-15M
- Planning, public outreach and design would take approximately 3 years
- Current staff resources are at full capacity
- Advancing work on South Broad Street would require approximately \$800K:
 - \$400K for staff- recruitment takes 4 months, training takes 1-2 years
 - \$400K for consultant services

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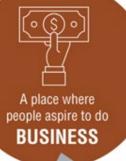

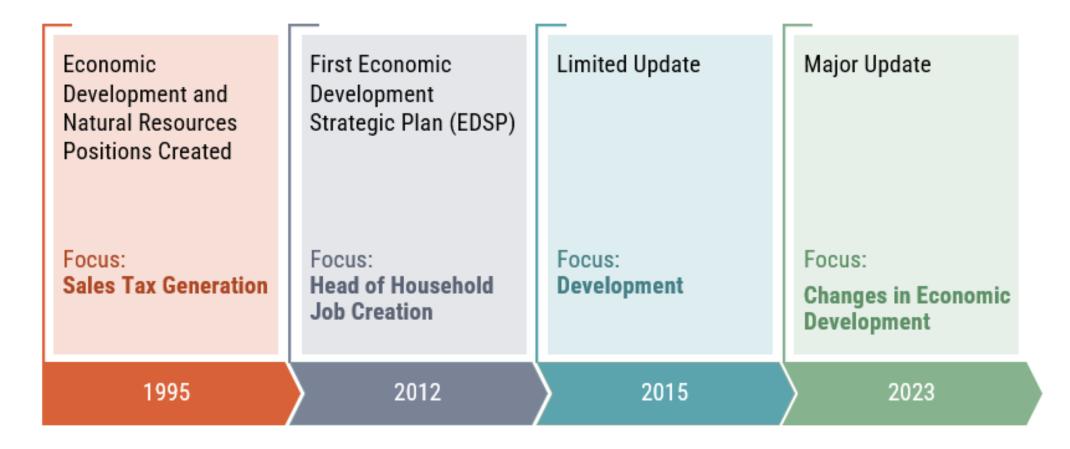

Tourism & Community Promotions

The City's Community Promotions Program – comprised of the Tourism Business Improvement District and Promotional Coordinating Committee - is responsible for promotion of San Luis Obispo locally, regionally, nationally, and internationally.





Tourism Business Improvement District (TBID)

- Established in 2008
- Funded through a 2% special assessment charged on hotel stays
- Administered by a 7-member Board of hoteliers
- Program Highlights:
 - Comprehensive Destination Marketing Program
 - VisitSLO.com + ShareSLO
 - Sustainable SLO & Keys For Trees initiative
- Work effort results in the transient occupancy tax (TOT) contribution to the City's General Fund (approx. \$11 million in FY23)













Promotional Coordinating Committee (PCC)

- Funded through general fund
- Purpose is to enhance quality of life for residents & quality of experience for visitors
- Directed by an advisory committee of 6-residents + 1-TBID liaison
- Program Functions:
 - Cultural Arts & Community Promotions Grant Programs
 - Community Placemaking Projects
 - Community Promotion
 - Visitor Services
 - Support Local Promotion

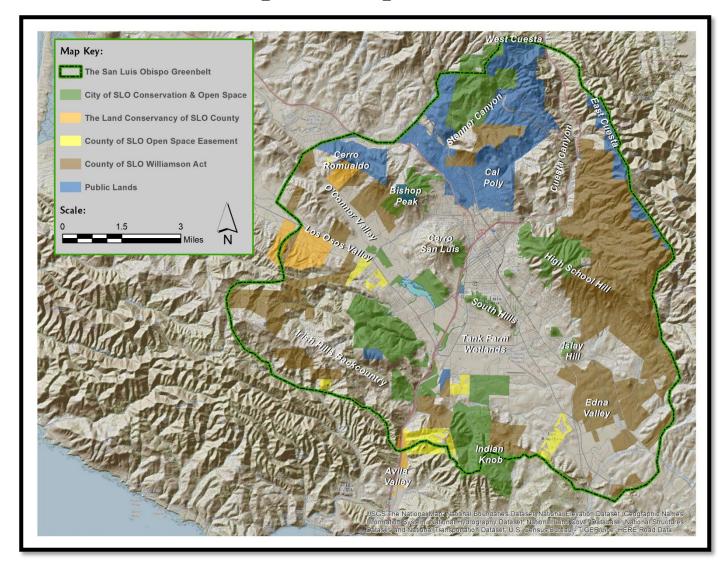






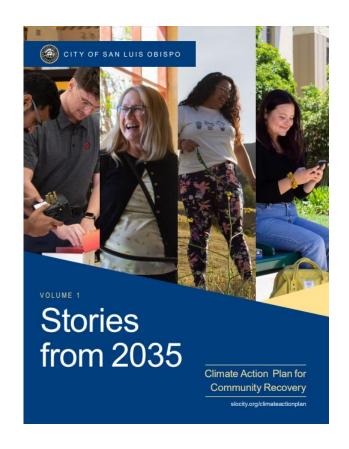


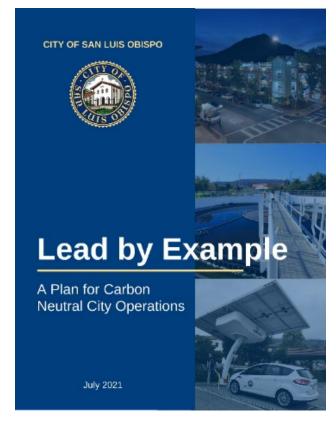
Greenbelt & Open Space Protection

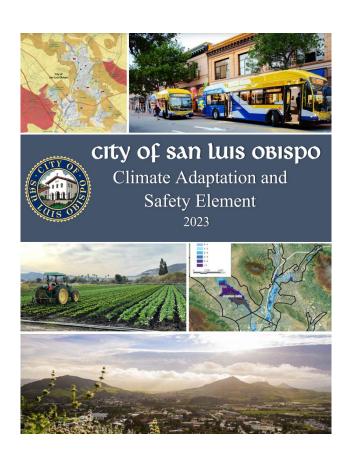


- Total Greenbelt Area = 54,400 acres
- City of San Luis Obispo Open Space = 4,100 acres
- City of San Luis Obispo Conservation
 Easements = 3,800 acres
- Public Lands = 9,500 acres
- Williamson Act = 15,000 acres
- Over 33,000 acres, or 60%, of the Greenbelt is in conservation status

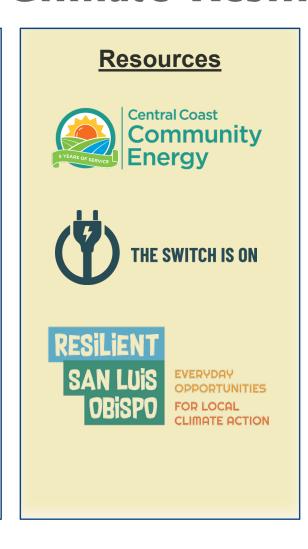




Climate Action & Climate Resilience
