The above quote was taken from the dedication program of the new facility when it was officially opened on Walnut Street in 1970.

This is a brief history of the San Luis Obispo Police Department. It provides a summary of the work accomplished over many years. In this year of 2006, San Luis Obispo looks back on 150 years as a city. It was changed from a township to a proper city in 1856. The City Police Department was established on May 26, 1911, and has served the community for 95 years. We wanted to take you on a historical trip, back to the development of the department and those who served this city to make it a safer and more desirable place to live.

It has been compiled to honor the men and women who have served and protected our city, giving their all, and for two men in particular, their lives. Any errors are solely my own. I have tried to truthfully and accurately portray the dedicated officers to the best of my ability.

In our 95 year history, so many events have occurred and I've only scratched the surface. To truly do the department history justice it would take years to gather all the information available. We wanted this information to be ready in time for the city's 150 year celebration, the sesquicentennial.
